### REMINDER OF EXPECTATIONS

Corsham6th welcomes students to the 6th Form and recognises the choice they have made to continue their education at The Corsham School. This agreement is an important commitment between the student, parents and Corsham6th and is a fundamental part of the enrolment process.

### Our Expectations

The Corsham School has the highest expectations of Corsham6th students and expects,

- 1. All students in Year 12 and 13 to attend the daily Tutorial Session.
- 100% attendance is expected to ALL Lessons, Tutor times and Core/EPQ Sessions. Attendance records will allow
  for legitimate reasons for absence, such as long-term illness, University visits, etc as well as exceptional
  circumstances.
- 3. Full engagement in Enrichment Activities that are offered at Corsham6th.
- 4. Make a positive contribution to the Corsham6th and whole school community.
- 5. All year 12 and 13 students are expected to work independently out of the classroom. As a guideline, we
- Year 12 students work independently out of the classroom for 6-8 hours per subject as a minimum. This should include self-directed study and prescribed homework tasks.
- Corsham6th Students should demonstrate the Corsham Character Values (Intellectual Values, Moral Values, Performance Values and Civic Values) in all they do.
- We encourage students to contribute to the wider Corsham School Community. We would expect students to set aside 1 hour per week.

Developing independence through positive learning experiences and being commitment to a rewarding education experience is a full-time responsibility. It is uncommon but students can be placed on Cause for Concern contracts if they are not meeting expectations. This will be communicated to parents/carers.

Candidates are encouraged to draw upon their experience of undertaking the project when writing their personal statement, particularly if the topic is allied to their chosen degree course."



- You can do both; some UK university courses offer a studying abroad option as part of their course.






## HOW TO CHOOSE A UNIVERSITY COURSE

- Go to university open and taster days to get a feel for subjects and different courses.
- Choose a course that you are passionate about or think you will enjoy.
- Check if the future career you're interested in requires certain subjects at a degree level.
- Research the entry requirements you will need for courses.
- Explore degree types: the standard honours degree, joint honours degree (two subjects) and sandwich degrees with work placements.
- Check how the course will be assessed and if this method suits you

### WHAT IS UCAS?

- UCAS is the Universities & Colleges Admissions Service.
- It's role is to manage applications for universities.
- Students pay a fee to UCAS to apply for a maximum of 5 universities and receive university offers via the UCAS website.
- Students use UCAS to confirm firm and insurance choices to their chosen university usually pending their results.
- After students receive their Year 13 grades, they can enter the clearing process through UCAS which enables them to select another university if they haven't got the right grades or changed their minds.

## Myths:

- Apprenticeships are for people who don't do well in school.
  - Employers look for quality as much so, if not more than Universities due to the investment.
- Apprentices are poorly paid.
  - Minimum wage is £4.81 an hour, but after completing 1 year this goes up if over age 19.
- Apprentices get stuck in the same sector or job.
   Gain transferable skills and experience, and do the same across apprenticeships to gain higher qualifications.
- Apprenticeships are for people who want to do 'manual' jobs.
   Not in all cases, there are apprenticeships in business, management, marketing, law, IT and more.
- Apprenticeships don't lead to full time employment.
   93% of apprentices remain employed on completion.



Average lifetime earnings of a higher apprentice


## Average lifetime earnings by type of qualification:

#### **GAP YEAR- FORMER STUDENTS**



#### **Pros**

It could look impressive on your CV

It gives you the opportunity to work and earn

You can pursue other passions

The life experience will help you to feel better prepared for university

#### Cons

It can be expensive to fund

You will be a year behind when you return

Transitioning back into full time study can be challenging

If you don't plan ahead, you might not spend a gap year being productive



#### SUPPORTING YOUR SON/DAUGHTER

- 1. Allow time for your child to revise, they may have less time for family commitments when revising.
- 2. Suggest that they revise in half-hour bursts with short breaks in between. <a href="http://www.bbc.com/future/story/20180208-an-effortless-way-to-strengthen-your-memory">http://www.bbc.com/future/story/20180208-an-effortless-way-to-strengthen-your-memory</a>
- 3. Provide them with a quiet space to work if possible, free from distractions (you might want to "remove" the distraction!)
- 4. Sit and listen to them if they want to read their work aloud to you.
- 5. Use the revision guide/ online resource.
- 6. BUT, you cannot do it for them!!!

Spend 20 minutes revising what you need to know to answer your chosen question

Set a timer for 20 minutes and answer the past paper question you chose Mark your answer

Using the mark scheme for the past paper mark your answer. This will help you to think like an examiner




STEP: 04 STEP 05

Get feedback

Show your teacher your work. Ask them whether your marking is accurate and how you could improve your answers





#### A-LEVEL REVISION TIPS



A- levels can be overwhelming, but hopefully these tips should make it easier.

#### 1 WRITE A TIMETABLE

It's so simple, the hardest part is sticking to it! If you struggle with consistency just plan out the next couple of days.



#### 2 FIND YOUR LEARNING STYLE

Whether it's visual, auditory or kinaesthetic choosing techniques within your learning style will help you understand and remember the information better.

#### 3 PAST PAPERS

'Past papers WILL save your life. Do them. Mark them. Get your teacher to mark them for you. Improve. You will thank me later.



#### 4 READ EXAMINERS' REPORTS, MARKING SCHEMES AND EXAMPLE ANSWERS

These help you tailor your answer to what the examiner is looking for. Looking at these regularly and comparing them to your own work will improve your structure and vocabulary. You can find them all online at your exam boards website.

#### 5 TAKE BREAKS

Taking breaks enables you to come back to your information with a fresh outlook, making you more productive. It also makes active reading easier and who doesn't want that?

#### 6 PRIORITISE

The only way to prevent burnout and you being so stressed out that you cry when your fave gets kicked out the Big Brother house [don't worry we've all been there].



#### LOOK OUT FOR SIGNS OF STRESS

One of the key trigger points for high degrees of pressure is when students do not feel that they are in control of their work. Getting organised so that work is not last minute helps to reduce stress. The best way to revise is in short, manageable chunks with breaks in between.











#### Did you know?



Increasing numbers of young people are seeking help because of exam-related stress and the pressures of doing well in their academic studies. The NSPCC has reported that there has been a sharp rise in the number of counselling sessions for 16-18 year olds, with many people worried about getting into universities and others concerned about their parents' reactions to results.

Reward effort more than grades - research shows that praising effort gets better results.

#### What can you do?



- Sometimes, some quite basic things are really crucial in periods of pressure: your child's mental energy, quality of sleep, ability to rest and recover, how much physical activity they are doing, their nutrition and how they are able to handle stress.
- It is important that they develop a Growth Mindset, looking at goals, motivation, focus and self-belief and understanding that if they cannot do something at the moment, they can persevere and achieve.
- One of the key trigger points for high degrees of pressure is when students do not feel that they are in control of their work. Getting organised so that work is not last minute helps to reduce stress.
- The best way to revise is in short, manageable chunks with breaks in between.

- Although sometimes teenagers like to think they
  can handle very late nights, that is not what the
  evidence suggests. Lack of sleep will quickly lead
  to underperformance and feelings of stress and
  anxiety. Encourage them to get eight hours sleep a
  night.
- Research shows that high use of social media
  is linked to poor mental health. One recent
  study shows that young adults who used social
  media heavily were three times more likely to be
  depressed than occasional users. Another study
  discovered that young people who exceeded two
  hours of social media use per day were more likely
  to claim that their mental health was 'fair' or
  'poor' than occasional users.
- Sometimes it is good to take your child out of the house for a break – go for a walk or for a drink, simply to get some fresh air. Experts say that this very simple act can make a difference to our mental health.


